

A Journey of Wonder Advent 2020

In Advent, we begin a new year in the church calendar. We begin with hope, with promise, with longing. We begin in faith knowing that God is true to His Word and His Promises. And yet, we look and recognize all that is not right in the world around us. We hold in one hand the hope and glory of the eternal Kingdom of God and in the other the temporal brokenness of our human experience.

Over the next several weeks of Advent, I invite you to walk with us in a journey of reflection and expectation as we follow the lights of the Advent wreath as they guide us to *Look Back to the Story with the Patriarchs*, *Look into the Vision with the Prophets*, *Look Around for the Kingdom with John the Baptist*, and *Look Ahead to the King with Mary*.

As we light the Advent candle each Sunday, we welcome and anticipate the journey ahead. We introduce the weekly Candle Prayer, look ahead to our walk, and prepare ourselves with one of the songs from Scripture called Canticles from the Daily Office.

Our weekday liturgy begins with **Invitation and Preparation** as we say together, “*O God, make speed to save us; O Lord, make haste to help us.*” We follow the invitation with the Candle Prayer for the week. Next, we **Listen and Receive** the Word of God. Then we **Reflect and Respond** to God’s Word at work in and among us. We close our weekday liturgy as we are **Blessed and Sent** to carry the light of Advent into the world.

Our week concludes on Saturday with the sabbath invitation to rest and delight in the Lord. We bid farewell to our week resting in the same Canticle which began our week, delighting in the recollection of our journey, and praying the Candle Prayer one last time for the week.

May we be obedient to your call and be ready and watchful to receive your Christ, a lamp to our feet and a light to our path; for you are our light and our salvation. Amen.

We walk this week with the patriarchs, the fathers of the nation of Israel. The story of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob guided and shaped the people of Israel as they were formed into a nation. As we journey through this week, I wonder what stories bring your family together? Who in your life has inspired your faith? What connections do you see between your story and the Great Story of God and His Creation?

Reflect and Respond

God speaks to Abram and disrupts his comfort with a call to step out in faith. God invites Abram to participate in the Great Story. Abram must choose between the comfortable life that he is enjoying in Haran and the difficult journey to a distant land, a land unknown and unspoken, a journey of faith into the promised blessing of God.

God may not be calling us to found nations, but He does still call us to walk in faith, stepping out of our comfort and into the Great Story.

Reflect and Respond

Abram has followed God and found the outward trappings of success in the new land. He has wealth and strength, but his wife Sarai has borne no children. He is ninety-nine years old when once more God appears to him and promises that he will be exceedingly fruitful, the father of kings and nations.

It is often difficult to hold onto the promises of God when it seems that hope is lost, when reason tells us that that it is impossible, and doubt and fear conspire against us telling us to just give up.

I wonder, as you consider whatever may be "missing" in your life, the hope or dream as yet unfulfilled, what promise of God can you cling to? How might you be watchful and waiting to receive God's improbable or even impossible answer to your prayers?

Reflect and Respond

God has given Abraham a miraculous son, the answer to all of Abraham's prayers and the fulfillment of all of God's promises, and now God calls Abraham to offer his son Isaac as a sacrifice. With faith in God's promise, Abraham obediently brings Isaac to the mountain where he prepares to make this unfathomable sacrifice, but the angel of the Lord stays his hand at the last moment and shows Abraham the ram for the sacrifice that God provided. Abraham walk in faith and so enters into the blessing that God has prepared.

While there are many aspects of this story that are foreign to our culture and in fact beyond our imagination, God still invites us to walk in faith even when it seems impossible, God still provides even when it seems hopeless, and we still walk in the blessing that God has prepared when we let Him guide our feet.

I wonder, in what way might God be inviting you to be obedient to His call, to step out in faith, to offer up something that you hold precious? In what way might God be inviting you to walk into the blessing that He has already prepared for you?

Reflect and Respond

Jacob, Isaac's son, Abraham's grandson, has spent 14 years estranged from his brother, Esau. Jacob took Esau's birthright and blessing by trickery. He has made a name and a family for himself in a distant land, but now he wishes to return. He can not fathom forgiveness or reconciliation with his brother, and yet he trusts God to guide his feet.

Broken relationships, particularly among family, can seem irreparable. We can get stuck in our own guilt or in our own anger. We can let fear immobilize us. Yet the God of our salvation calls us to pray and walk in the way of reconciliation.

I wonder, are there relationships within your family or close friends that seem irreparable? How might God be inviting you to pray and walk in the way of reconciliation?

Reflect and Respond

There is once again trouble and Jacob is fearful of the people around him. God again calls to Jacob, and Jacob and his household put away their idols and foreign gods and travel once again to the place where Jacob prayed before meeting Esau. God meets Jacob once more. He gives Jacob a new name and reassures Jacob of both the power of God and the promise of God. Jacob responds in worship.

In this time of disruption and uncertainty, it is easy for us to be afraid. However, even in our fear, God calls us to come and meet him, to cast away the idols and foreign gods that we carry around with us, the idols of money, status, power, lust, and greed, to come to him and receive our name, to hear God call us "Beloved," to be reminded of the mighty power and steadfast promise of God, and to respond in worship.

I wonder, how might God be calling you?

Reflect and Respond

It is with this passage from Isaiah's prophecy that Jesus initiates His ministry in his own hometown. This message of healing and restoration, of wholeness and salvation, becomes the theme of Luke's account of the ministry of Christ and the ministry of the Apostles.

We live in a time in between, the time between the initiation of the Kingdom of God in Jesus and the fullness of our life in the Kingdom when Christ returns. We can easily forget that Jesus boldly proclaimed that this prophecy had been fulfilled in Him. We can easily forget that Jesus is Emmanuel, God with Us.

I wonder, in this in between time, in what ways do you experience the presence of God? In what ways might God be inviting you to experience healing and restoration?

Reflect and Respond

Again, Isaiah draws us into the hope of the Messiah, a hope that shines as light in the darkness and freedom for the oppressed. This is a hope that changes contempt into glory and suffering into joy.

In this season, the darkness that holds the world captive is evident every time we turn on the news. The fear, deception, and hatred that bring contempt and oppression surround us. If we look, we can see them in our neighborhoods, on social media, and even in ourselves.

I wonder, what darkness, fear, or oppression threatens you? How might the Light of Christ bring freedom, glory, and rejoicing even in our present struggle?

Reflect and Respond

Isaiah gives us a vision of the sovereign reign of the Lord, the time when the Kingdom of God is established forever. We find here names for the Messiah - Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. We also find the promise of true peace, *shalom*, under the gracious rule of God.

It is difficult for me to read this passage without hearing the glorious music of Handel's *Messiah*. The Biblical prophecy and musical vision stir my heart and bring tears to my eyes. Deep within me, I recognize the truth and the promise of God's sovereignty, His justice and righteousness, His love and His zeal.

I wonder, as you consider the great majesty of God, in what way might He be inviting you to participate in the *shalom* of the Kingdom of God?
